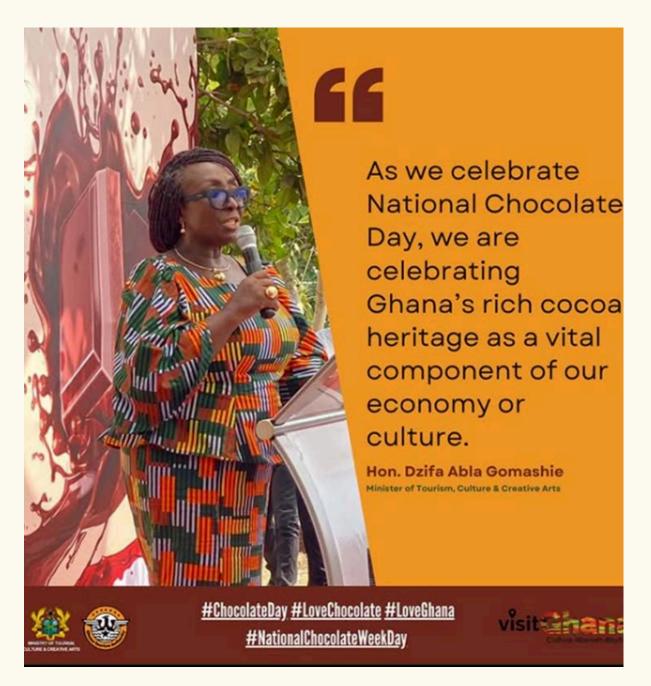

Ghana Celebrates 2025 National Chocolate Week with a Call to "Eat Chocolate, Stay Healthy, Grow Ghana"



Accra, Ghana – Ghana's 2025 National Chocolate Week was celebrated in grand style from February 3rd to 14th, with a nationwide campaign to promote the health benefits of cocoa, encourage local chocolate consumption, and boost domestic tourism. Held under the theme "Eat Chocolate, Stay Healthy, Grow Ghana", and the sub-theme "Chocolate for All: Taste, Share, and Care", the event was spearheaded by the Ghana Tourism (GTA) in collaboration Authority COCOBOD and the Cocoa Processing Company (CPC), under the auspices of the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts.

Originally rooted in National Chocolate Day, which coincides with Valentine's Day, the expanded Chocolate Week has evolved into a powerful platform for national pride, economic empowerment, and health education.

Key activities included nationwide media sensitization, exhibitions, culinary contests, educational sessions for school children, and community engagements such as church and mosque visitations, cocoa farm tours, and hospital outreach programs. The celebration culminated in a colourful street float and chocolate feast in Accra, and tasting events at the Kotoka International Airport.

Stakeholders emphasized cocoa's role in improving health—such as reducing stress. and boosting immunity—while also spotlighting the sector's economic importance. The week-long event highlighted the growing impact of local cocoa processing, with Ghana's per capita cocoa consumption reportedly increasing from 0.45 kg to 1 kg in recent years.

Despite its success, organizers acknowledged challenges such as affordability and called for more industry participation to make chocolate accessible to all. Future editions aim to deepen cocoa tourism, empower farmers, and encourage innovation in product development.



The 2025 National Chocolate Week reinforced Ghana's global reputation as a top cocoa producer and showcased chocolate not just as a symbol of love, but as a tool for national development.



Tourism Minister Rallies Support for Ghanaian Chocolate in Parliament

Ghana Celebrates 20th Kwahu Paragliding Festival with Thrills, Culture, and Tourism Boost

Kwahu Atibie, Ghana – April 21, 2025

Ghana marked the 20th edition of its flagship Kwahu Paragliding Festival this Easter, drawing hundreds of visitors to the Odweanoma Mountain in Kwahu Atibie. The four-day event, held from April 18–21, was organized by the Ministry of Tourism to promote both domestic and international tourism under the theme "The 20th National Paragliding Festival", in collaboration with the Black Star Experience.

In his keynote address, Deputy Minister Hon. Yussif Issaka Jajah emphasized the festival's growing role in making tourism a key contributor to Ghana's GDP. He highlighted the unique blend of adventure and culture that the event brings, showcasing Ghana's hospitality and scenic beauty.

Seven certified pilots, including one Ghanaian, gave over 200 people a breathtaking aerial view of the Kwahu landscape. Ground activities featured traditional games like oware and ludo, cultural displays, music performances, and food vendors, making the event inclusive and family-friendly.

Despite minor setbacks including delayed launches and high food prices, the festival was hailed as a success. Organizers aim to improve seating, punctuality, and pilot availability in future editions.

The festival continues to position Kwahu as a premier adventure tourism destination in West Africa.

Day Two of Kwahu Paragliding Festival Soars with Paragliding, Games, and Ghanaian Cuisine



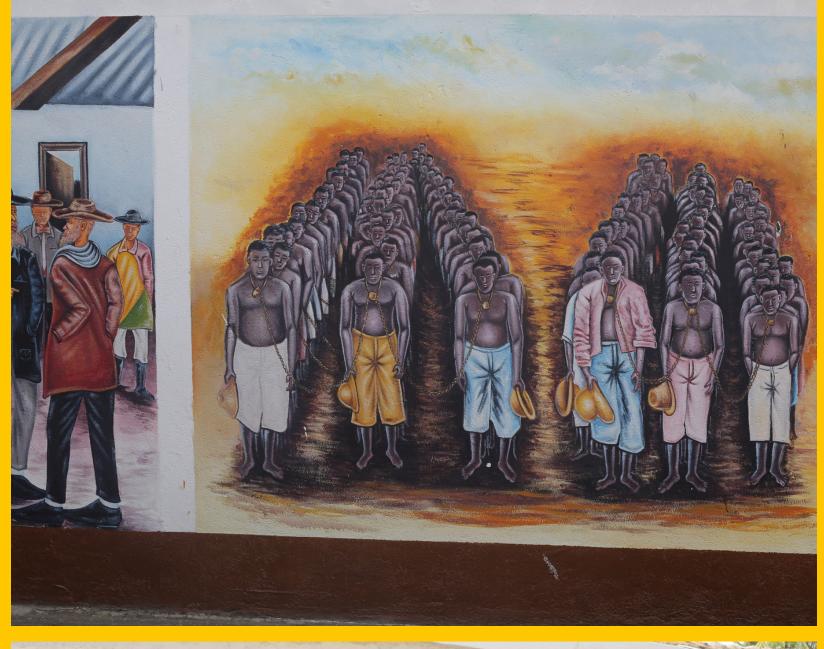

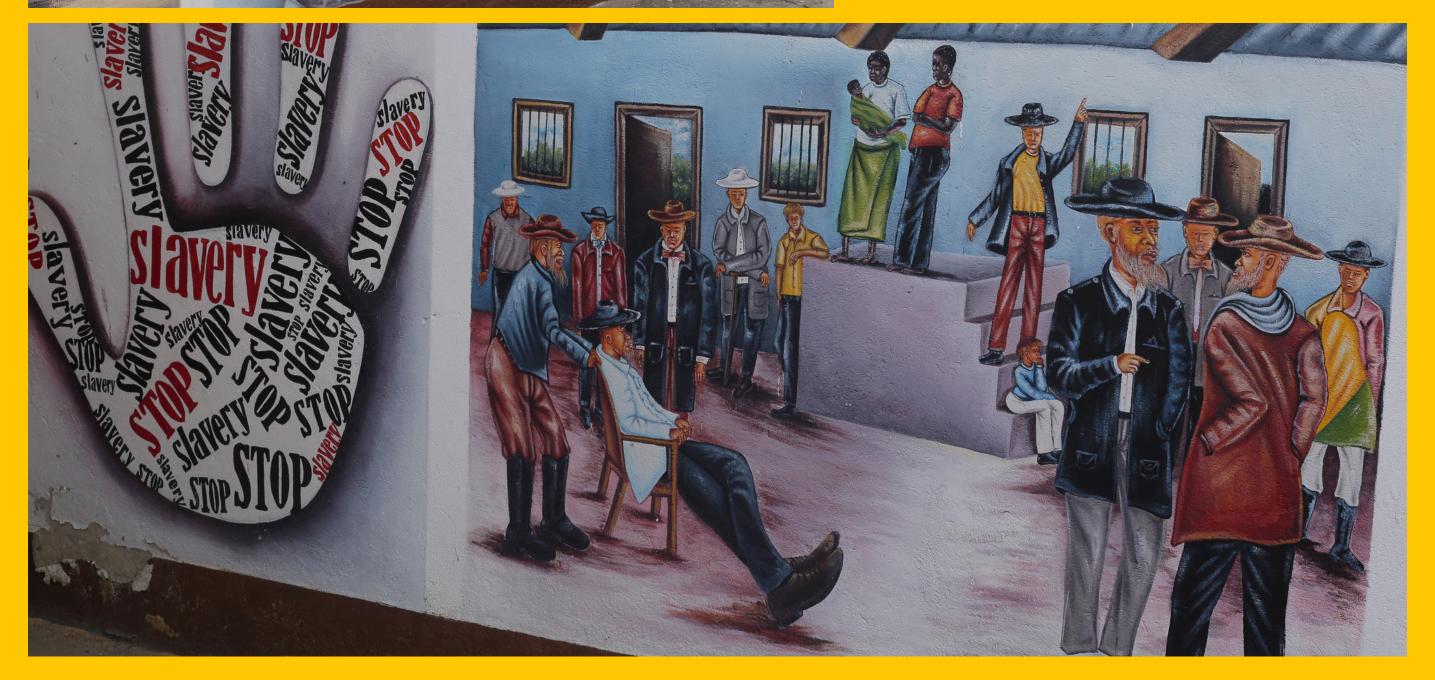




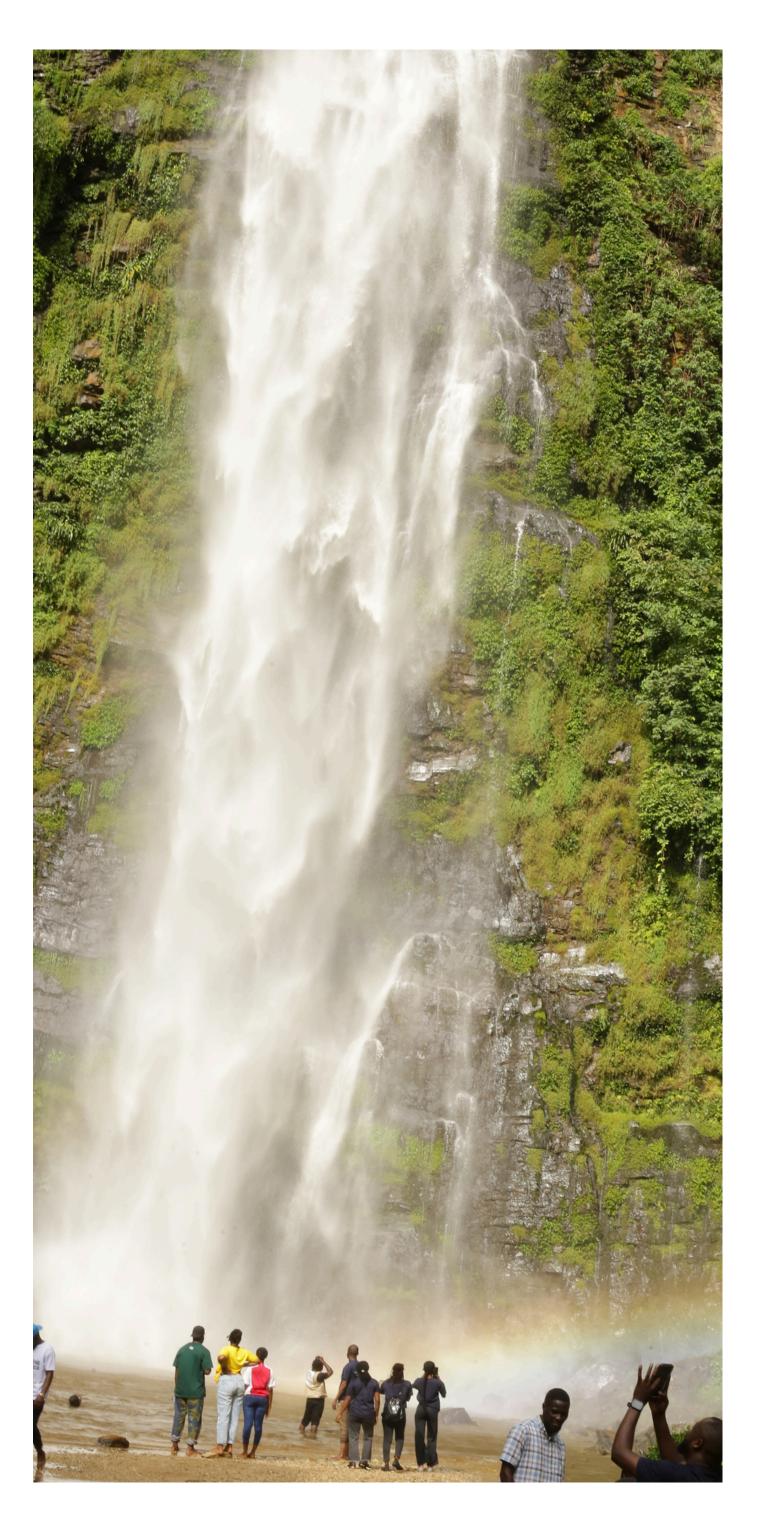
HED-ADZIDO SLAVE MARKET MEMORIAL

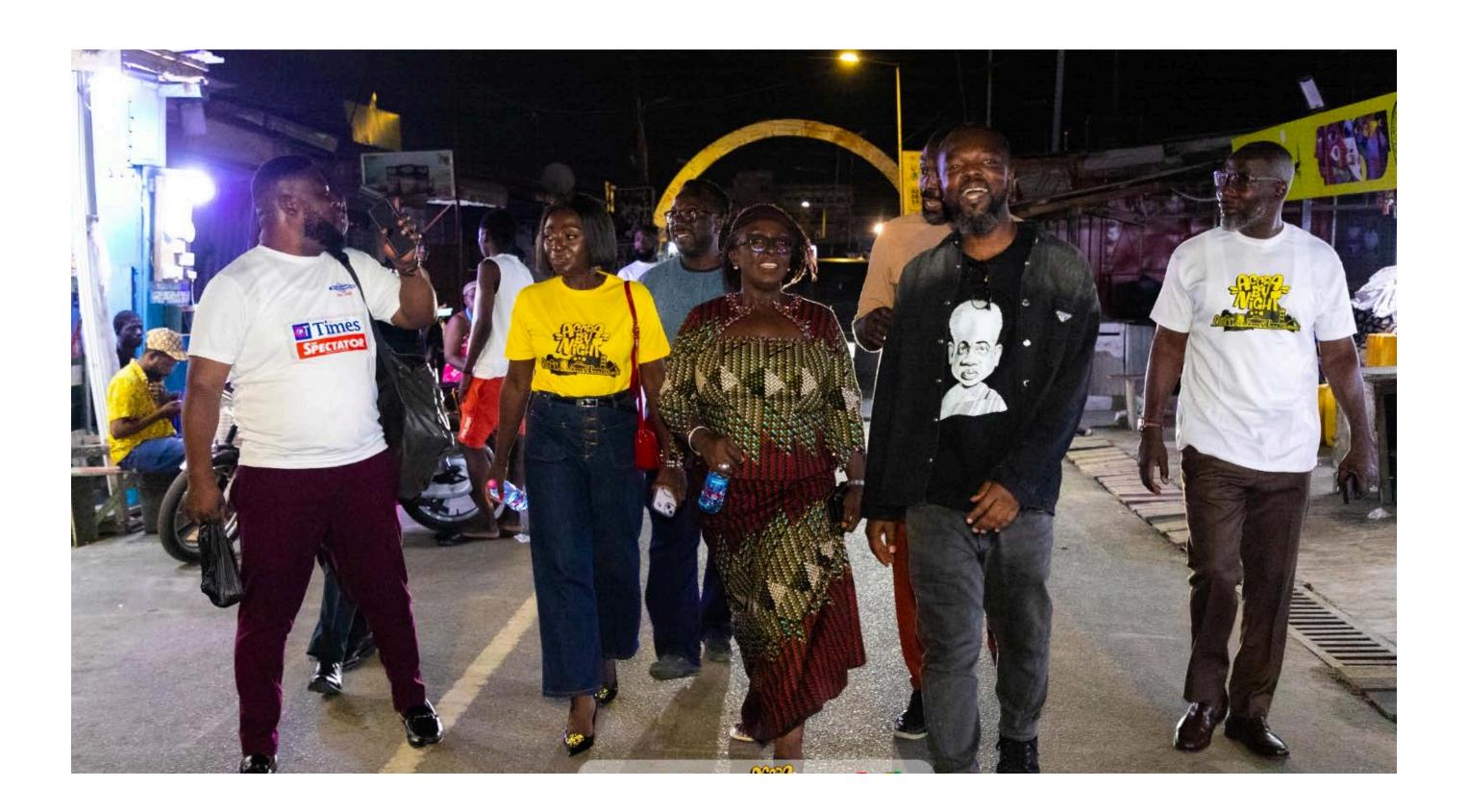




The occasion featured traditional drumming, dancing, and storytelling, reflecting Ghana's rich cultural tapestry.

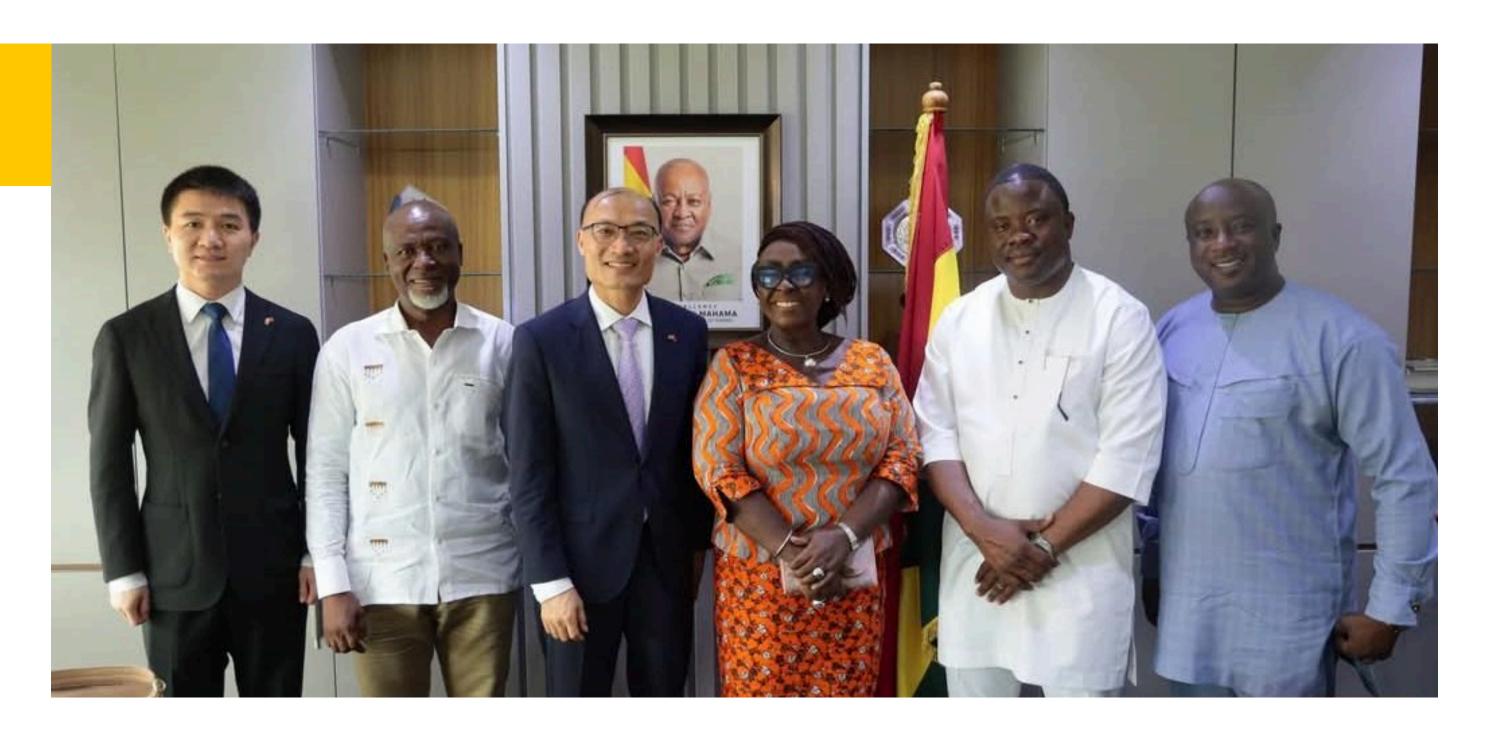

Chinese Ambassador Pays Courtesy Call on Ghana's Minister for Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts to Deepen Bilateral Ties

Female MPs Trained in Ada to Push for Gender Reforms in Parliament



A two-day training workshop was organised by the National Commission for Civic Education (NCCE) to sensitise Ghanaian female Members of Parliament (MPs) on the Affirmative Action (AA) Law was held from 6 -7th May 2025.

The workshop held at the Aqua Safari Resort in Ada aimed at providing the MPs with lobbying skills, advocacy and the necessary tools for the act to be fully enforced.

Madam Kathleen Addy, Chairperson of the NCCE, opening the workshop, said the sensitisation was important for the female MPs to help materialise the benefits envisaged in the law.

Madam Addy said there were a lot of reforms to be made to help more women emerge as parliamentarians, citing Rwanda, where 64 per cent of its parliamentarians are females.

Madam Addy said the AA law must impress upon political parties to reserve a percentage of their parliamentary seats for women, an intervention she believes would make women part of policymaking.

She lamented that Ghana has 50 per cent of its population being women but only 14 per cent of women in Ghana's parliament are women.

The MPs expressed satisfaction about the workshop, acknowledging that women have always been marginalised and less catered for.

The Minister for Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts, Hon. Abla Dzifa Gomashie, and MP for Ketu South and a queen mother in the Aflao Traditional Area, said that a female child could equally be raised by her parents to perform tasks of all kinds, rather than segregating duties to be performed with gender identification.

She said aside what biologically identifies us as men and women, and may be our strength levels, every other thing can be done by both genders, adding that countries that have women in leadership are doing better than Ghana.

The MP for Salaga South, Madam Zuwera Mohammed Ibrahimah, added her voice and said the Affirmative Action Law, which was passed and assented to last year, would not be one of the many laws that are not in use.

According to her, female MPs would get themselves acquainted with the law, engage various stakeholders, and then disseminate an action plan to the citizenry to empower and encourage many women to accept leadership positions in the country.

Ghana Launches Fleet Pool Management Service to Boost Tourism Transport Experience



On Monday, May 7, 2025, the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts and MP for Ketu South, Hon. Abla Dzifa Gomashie launched the Fleet Pool Management Service (FPMS), a transport service by the Ghana Tourism Development Company (GTDC) that aims to solve the transportation challenges in the tourism sector.

According to Hon. Abla Dzifa Gomashie, the goal of the initiative is to ensure that movement between destinations in Ghana is as enjoyable as the attractions themselves.

She stated that tourism is not just about the sights. It is about the experience, and the experience starts the moment a tourist lands in Ghana. If transportation is poor, we risk losing visitors and damaging our reputation.

Hon. Abla Dzifa Gomashie stressed the need for better connectivity and called on African countries to work together to improve direct flight connections within the continent. According to her, travelling across Africa is expensive and tiring. We therefore need partnerships with countries that have national carriers to make this easier, she stated.

The Fleet Pool Management Service (FPMS) is designed not just as a short-term strategy, but as a model for long-term transformation. It will help support better driving standards, compliance with national regulations, and overall growth in the tourism ecosystem.

The minister urged other tourism-related businesses, such as hotels, restaurants, and cultural institutions, to also reflect Ghana's identity in what they offer by playing Ghanaian music in their hotel lobbies, decorating the place with local art, and serving Ghanaian food in creative ways. She asked hoteliers to let tourists feel the culture at every turn.

Concluding her address, she urged stakeholders to embrace innovation and a spirit of service, which has Ghana's development at the forefront. She expressed confidence that, with collective effort, tourism could become a key pillar of the nation's economic growth.

The Ag. The Chief Executive Officer of the GTDC said the FPMS will use the Private Public Partnership Approach to improve transportation in the tourism sector, with GTDC doing the legwork to get the customers.

To do this, he said the GTDC will ensure that there is a database on drivers to organise tour driving and track to give accurate information to tourists.

Though he acknowledged that collecting data in Ghana is cumbersome and challenging, he said GTDC will support by organising this using a different kind of orientation.

The initiative is a way to position Ghana by helping to overcome the challenges for us to achieve the Black Star Experience.

According to Prof. Kobby Mensah, FPMS is a forward-looking transport network that would ensure a professional system that has a dependable supply system in place.

Ghana Reaffirms Commitment to Africa's Tourism Growth at FITA 2025 in Tunisia



The Deputy Minister for Tourism, Culture and Creative Arts, Hon. Yussif Issaka Jajah, represented the Honourable Minister at the 8th Edition of the Financing Investment and Trade in Africa (FITA 2025), held in Tunis, Tunisia. The theme for the Ministerial Panel on Tourism was "Capitalising on Africa's Tourism Potential to Boost the Economy."

The panel featured high-level representatives, including ministers and deputy ministers from Tunisia, Mauritania, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Libya, Tanzania, Madagascar, and Ghana, alongside private sector stakeholders such as Mr. Mossadeck Bally, Founder and CEO of Azalaï Hotels Group.

The discussions reflected strong alignment among African states on the need to prioritise regional integration, harmonise visa regimes, strengthen public-private partnerships, and establish a Pan African Tourism Investment Facility.

The Deputy Minister concluded by reaffirming Ghana's readiness to collaborate, cocreate, and contribute meaningfully to Africa's tourism transformation agenda.

Bella, a young entrepreneur in Accra, once dismissed the idea of wearing Ghanaian prints daily. To her, traditional wear was reserved for special occasions, Fridays at best. Her wardrobe was filled with imported fabrics, believing they were more "modern" and professional. But one day, she found herself in a bustling fabric market, watching a skilled woman meticulously weave Kente patterns with a technique passed down through generations.

Curious, she struck up a conversation. She explained how each thread represented a story, how every pattern carried meaning, a legacy of the past woven into the future. More than that, the sale of just one piece of fabric fed families, sustained communities, and kept centuries-old craftsmanship alive.

That moment changed Bella's perspective. She realized that every time she chose foreign prints over her heritage, she was not only neglecting Ghanaian artisans but also the economy that thrived when people embraced their own. Since then, she's made it a mission to proudly wear Ghanaian fabrics daily, not out of obligation, but because it reflects who she is, a proud Ghanaian investing in her people's craft and future.

Why must anyone convince you to wear Ghanaian-made fabrics? Why should African prints be reserved only for Fridays while other prints dominate our wardrobes throughout the week? This mindset does more than just dictate fashion choices; it speaks volumes about how we value our heritage and economy.

Every stitch of Ghanaian fabric carries history, craftsmanship, and an economy that thrives when we choose to wear what is ours. Each piece purchased fuels employment, putting money directly into the pockets of tailors, textile workers, and designers who, in turn, contribute to the local market, sustaining a cycle of economic growth. It's more than fashion, it's empowerment.

The reality is simple: supporting Ghanaian-made products, whether fabrics, food, or crafts, isn't just an act of patriotism but an investment in our identity and prosperity. The push to embrace our culture should not rely on persuasion. It should be an innate understanding that preserving and promoting Ghanaian creativity is everyone's responsibility.

The Black Star Experience, envisioned as a program, is not merely an initiative; it is a lifestyle. It is a call to immerse ourselves in the richness of Ghanaian hospitality, cuisine, and traditions that make us distinct. Our daily choices should reflect our pride; from the foods we eat to the garments we wear, and the stories we tell the world.

Let us move beyond scheduled cultural appreciation and make Ghanaians wear a daily declaration of who we are. Let our support for local industries be an ongoing commitment, not just an occasional token. This is our identity; this is our economy. Let's own it—every day of the week.

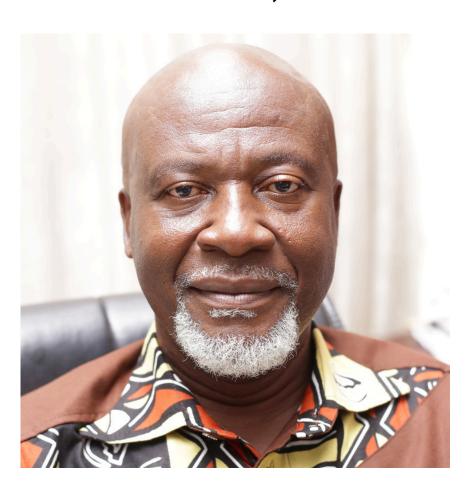

EMY Africa Courts Tourism Ministry for Strategic Partnership Ahead of Landmark Events Across Africa

ACCRA, GHANA – MAY 15, 2025





The Executive Director of EMY Africa, Kojo Soboh, has paid a courtesy call on the Minister for Tourism, Arts and Culture, Hon. Abla Dzifa Gomashie, as part of efforts to deepen collaboration between the government and the private sector in promoting Ghanaian culture on the international stage.

"We are descendants of storytellers. We must do better at telling our own stories with excellence," she stated passionately.

The Minister reaffirmed her personal commitment to supporting EMY Africa's initiatives and welcomed further collaboration between the Ministry and the brand. She also highlighted the importance of partnerships over competition between government and private cultural stakeholders.

"This is not a competition. If we have people doing what we're supposed to be doing, we must embrace them as collaborators. Your proposal is not only different; it speaks to a higher level of engagement and visibility for Ghana," Hon. Gomashie concluded.

The meeting also saw the presence of Mr. Divine Kwame Owusu Ansah, Director for Culture at the Ministry, signalling official interest in ongoing dialogue between EMY Africa and government agencies as Ghana positions itself as a top destination for cultural and creative experiences across the continent.

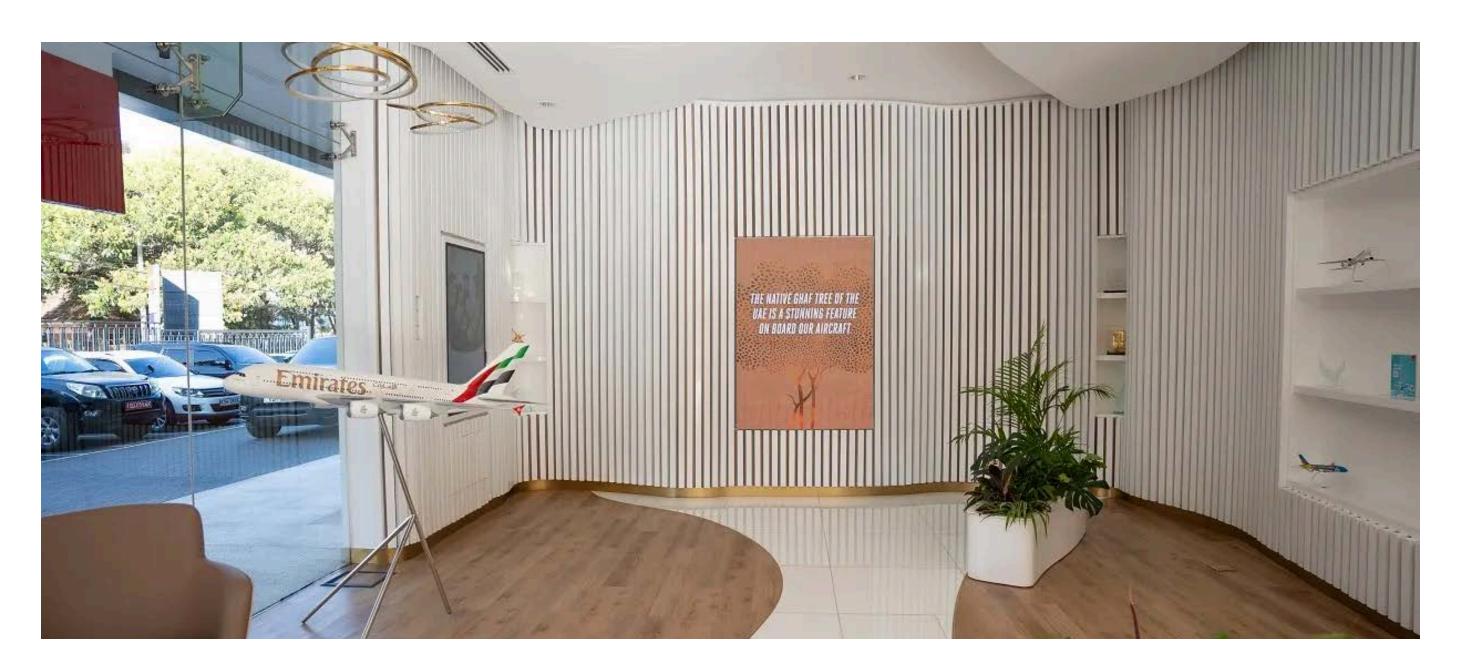
